Mythology/Senior English

Course concepts: The overall focus of this course is to explore divergent cultures, belief systems, and texts. The goal is to allow students greater global awareness by providing a vehicle through which they can gain understanding of current and ancient people from all parts of the globe. This is done objectively with the desire to encourage students to become globally aware and sensitive to the practices of other cultures. Additionally, it provides a forum for insight into how we are (as a species) more alike than we are different.

The Four Functions of Mythology:

- 1) To reconcile human consciousness with the preconditions for its existence (metaphysical).
- 2) To formulate an image of the universe in keeping with the science of the time (cosmological).
- 3) To validate and maintain a specific moral and social order (sociological).
- 4) To shape individuals to their various social groups, bearing them on from birth to death through the course of a human life (psychological).

Success Criterion:

Students will research mythological topics of interest, write a variety of academic and creative responses to texts, create presentations, and write an MLA formatted research paper. Students will develop critical thinking skills while participating in active reading, group discussion, Socratic seminar, and large and small group projects.

Details:

This is a yearlong course divided into two semesters – fall and spring. The first semester deals primarily with the foundations of myth, the research paper, and the earliest forms of mythology.
